recent POLICE ALERTS

from Sgt. Peter Rogers, Neighbourhood Policing Team

- VEHICLE THEFTS** from farms.
Several Quad bikes were stolen in August.. the most recent information on suspicious vehicles relates to a blue 04 plate VW Golf which has been acting suspiciously on or near farms.
Overnight 4th to 5th September 2012, a Nissan Navarra Pickup (silver in colour) was stolen from farm premises in Bugthorpe. Keys were stolen from a workshop.
During the afternoon of 5th September 2012, a blue Range Rover was stolen from farm premises in Aughton.
Patrols are checking rural locations overnight. It is possible that offenders are coming into the area during the day to identify possible sites for burglaries.
- WARNING** to residents, particularly elderly people, to be aware that we've had individuals going door to door in the Market Weighton area offering to power wash drives and then charging what would seem to be exorbitant amounts. One lady was charged £350!
Police have alerted trading standards as this constitutes a civil matter rather than a criminal one, as the householder has agreed to the work being done. However, people should be vigilant and if they feel they are being pressurised in any way let the police know. The simple answer is to say "no".
- BURGLARY** Domestic premises in Pocklington entered and cash stolen.
The kitchen door had been left insecure. Can I again remind everyone to **be vigilant and consider home security.**
Most recent figures show that 46% of domestic burglaries across the East Riding of Yorkshire are due to insecurities.

Stephen Green, now living in Cambridgeshire, writes:

Huggate is often on my mind, remembering times spent on my uncle Ted's Glebe farm when we visited during school holidays from Harrogate. I was born at Northfield farm Huggate in 1936, son of Arthur & Clara Green. My dad was the stepson of Richard Gatenby and Rosina (my real Granma).

There were 7 of us at Northfield farm until about 1940 with Dad (Arthur Green) having tried in vain to keep Northfield running after the death of Richard Gatenby, his Stepfather.

ST MARY'S CHURCH CONSECRATION OF BURIAL GROUND EXTENSION

There has been a church on the site of St Mary's at Huggate for over 800 years and our current church remains more or less unchanged since its mid nineteenth century renovation. To the casual onlooker it may also be assumed that it's beautiful setting is equally constant, but in reality this is not the case. About 30 years ago our church yard was extended as a result of the generosity of the then owner of the adjacent farm, Sir Richard Prince-Smith Bt. Although the physical incorporation of the land was made some time in the mid 1970s, the new addition was never consecrated for burial. It is now time to consecrate this new section.

As an active conservationist, Dr Neave has helped to save many buildings in the East Riding, including the church of St James, Warter. He was founder chairman of the Yorkshire Wolds Buildings Preservation Trust, and is chairman of Hornsea Museum Trust, vice-chairman of East Yorkshire Historic Churches Trust, a member of York Minster Fabric Advisory Committee and the Board of York Archaeological Trust. ROAD CLOSURES

ERYC has given notices (dated, presumably with clairvoyance, 20th September) of road closures, in or after late October, for resurfacing:

Pocklington Lane / Road from Mill Lane (crossroads) to the junction with Millington Pastures
Iron Fence Road (the lane joining the A166 at Walker's)
